CALL FOR ARTISTS Request for Qualifications (RFQ)

FEBRUARY 2021

The City of Cleveland, through its Public Art Program, is requesting qualifications from artists or designers or teams thereof who may be interested in producing public artwork for the Kovacic Recreation Center, 6250 St. Clair Avenue. The center is currently under renovation.

Rather than submit pre-conceived proposals, the selected artist will work with center and other city staff, neighborhood residents, and other stakeholders to develop innovative, original art that is relevant to Kovacic and the surrounding neighborhood.

The Public Art Program

The Public Art Program requires that certain major capital projects undertaken by the City set aside 1.5% of their project budgets for use toward public art.

Program requirements are that the artwork be in proximity to the improvements that generated the funding for the artwork.

Eligibility

This competition is open to qualified artists and designers or teams thereof, aged 18 or over and based in Northeast Ohio. Artists with connections to the St. Clair-Superior neighborhood or nearby places on the east side of Cleveland are especially encouraged to apply.

Location of Kovacic Recreation Center

Project information

Kovacic Recreation Center was built in 1919 by the City of Cleveland as the St. Clair Bath House and has been in use for community-oriented purposes ever since. The current renovation will transform the interior of the center into a state-of-the-art recreation facility and open it up for additional community uses.

Artwork can take many forms in the new Kovacic, including, but not limited to sculpture, murals, or suspended works. There could be one major artwork or several smaller ones. No artwork may be attached to the outside of the building, and artworks must be designed to require minimal maintenance.

The artwork must engage and address the building's interior front atrium and lobby space, though the extension of the artistic concept to related interior spaces may be considered.

Renovation plans and additional photos of the renovation work appear after the submission requirements. See pages 4–9. A simulated walkthrough of the atrium area can be downloaded from this link.

Project budget

The budget for this project is \$64,000. The budget is all-inclusive and required to cover all public artrelated expenses, including, but not limited to, design or artist fee, engineering, fabrication, and installation. Additionally, there is an allowance in the construction general contract to assist with installation-related infrastructure costs. There are no funds available for travel-related expenses.

Submission requirements

Artists or teams are required to electronically submit a <u>one-page</u> narrative describing their qualifications and explaining why they would be interested in working on this project. Artists should indicate what general vision they have and approaches they would take to this project and make note of how they would involve neighborhood residents, center staff, and others in developing their design.

Please note that artists are NOT being asked to submit proposals at this time.

Additionally, artists are required to submit, in electronic format:

- An up-to-date CV or resume;
- Up to 10 images depicting completed relevant work in JPEG or PNG format (none of the images may contain identifying information), suitable for inclusion in a PPT or PDF presentation; and
- An annotated slide list for the depicted artworks, including location, commissioning agency, materials, and total project budget. Submitters should note what their role was in producing the works depicted.

Up to three artists or designers or teams thereof will be invited to interview with the City of Cleveland's Public Art Committee.

Submission deadline








